

North Carolina State Education Assistance Authority (SEAA) is a state agency that offers three programs (the Opportunity Scholarship, the Disabilities Grant, and the Education Savings Account) to North Carolina (NC) families to expand school choice for their eligible students in kindergarten through 12th grade. This document lists the similarities and differences across the programs.

Similarities

- ▶ SEAA is charged with the administration of the Program, which includes managing the application and award process, ensuring that eligible schools meet program requirements, verifying student eligibility, and disbursing funds.
- ▶ Nonpublic schools must register with SEAA to participate in one or more of the programs.
- ▶ To qualify for any of the programs, a student must meet *all* of the following requirements:
 - Be a resident of NC
 - Be 5 on or before August 31 of the upcoming school year
 - Be younger than 22 as of the date the upcoming school year begins
 - Not have a high school diploma
 - Apply and enroll to an eligible school
 - Has not enrolled in a postsecondary institution (college or university) as a full-time student taking at least 12 hours of credit
